Step Six: All Defects of Character Don't Vanish

If I had any hope that working the Twelve Steps would perfect me, reading about Step Six in *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions* brought me back to reality:

"It is nowhere evident, at least in this life, that our Creator expects us fully to eliminate our instinctual drives. So far as we know, it

is nowhere on the record that God has completely removed from any human being all his natural drives."

Even the phrase, "were entirely ready," has to be looked at from the human perspective. Although our Higher Power can remove our defects of character, that shouldn't be the expectation of a recovering alcoholic working Step Six. Anyway, who among us can say with any degree of honesty that we are entirely



ready to have God remove EVERY one of our defects of character?

The book explains that only Step One can be practiced perfectly. "The remaining eleven Steps state perfect ideals. They are goals toward which we look, and the measuring sticks by which we estimate our progress."

Progress, not perfection! — Tom K. (home group: Sunday 8:30 a.m. Big Book Study, Serenity House, Libertyville.

Tradition Six

"An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property and prestige divert us from our primary purpose."

Tradition Six: Keeping the 'Main Thing'....

From Tradition Six in the book, Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, Alcoholics Anonymous:

"The moment that we saw we had an answer for alcoholism, it was reasonable (or so it seemed at the time) for us to feel that we might have the answer to a lot of other things."

"Maybe these places would make great sums of money to carry on our other good works."

"We'd spill A.A. into the dark regions of dope addiction and criminality."

"It stood to reason that if alcoholism could be licked, so could any problem."

"Why, we thought, our Society of Alcoholics Anonymous might prove to be the spearhead of a new spiritual advance! We might transform the world."

Gee, who says recovering alcoholics dream big...and have problems facing reality?

Actually, the Sixth Tradition evolved as our early members did see the very real and unintended results of trying to apply the A.A. approach and reputation to related facilities and outside enterprises. It became clear that A.A. as a whole, along with our individual members, would best be safeguarded by ensuring that we never endorse any related enterprise, and never "lend the A.A. name to any cause other than our own."

As we reject the notion of diverting from our primary purpose, we remember the value of our personal and combined humility and singleness of purpose. A.A. continues to reach the alcoholic who still suffers while "keeping the main thing, the main thing."—Tom K.
